Eligibility

- Be a woman (assigned female at birth and/or self-identify as female).
- Have completed at least one year of tertiary education with a B+ average.

You must also be able to demonstrate financial hardship.

- A personal statement (up to 500 words) that outlines the special circumstances that make you a candidate for this scholarship.
- Two referee reports (please ensure you use the templates provided on the scholarship webpage).
- Academic Transcripts covering your academic record to date.

Tips for Applicants

Writing Your Personal Statement

Think of your statement like a job application; convince us that YOU are the best candidate for this scholarship.

- Start by introducing yourself; tell us about your background, where you've studied and/or worked and what your interests are.
- Tell us why you want to study this programme.
- Explain what your intentions and career aspirations are once you complete your studies.
- Describe how this scholarship will help you to overcome your (financial) challenges and achieve your goals.

Selecting Your Referees

<u>Character Referee</u>: a person who has known you for at least three years who can attest to your good character. This should preferably be someone in a position of authority (e.g., teacher, employer, youth group leader, family friend in a managerial and/or professional role).

<u>Academic Referee</u>: a tutor who is able to comment on your academic performance, work ethic and attendance, along with your ability to succeed in this programme.

Referees must not be immediate family, friends, or flatmates.
